MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Dear Neighbor,

If there was a theme to the major accomplishments of the town during 2012, it would be this: North Beach is now able to manage more effectively the longstanding issues of parking, recreation, flooding and wetlands restoration. Acquiring ownership of significant, undeveloped parcels of land strategically located within the town was essential to this effort.

The large vacant lot north of 5th Street between Bay and Chesapeake Avenues will be dedicated to parking for commuters and tourists. The vacant lot on the east side of Chesapeake Avenue, across from the new North Beach Professional Building, will be improved for additional parking for the businesses located at the northern end of town.

The corner of 3rd and Bay will be developed this spring as a passive recreation park for residents and visitors to town. There will be no townhouse or condo development on this site. The Council will soon select a professional landscape architect with public park design experience to assist in the plans for this area.

Most recently, the town finally acquired the remaining parcels of wetlands west of Route 261 between North Beach and the Holland Point community. These wetland areas are badly degraded and their restoration is important in our efforts to address the persistent flooding and beach erosion in the northern end of town. We are actively meeting with the Army Corps of Engineers to implement measures which will accomplish these goals and preserve the integrity of Route 261 as it passes through the wetlands.

Congratulations to the winners of the Holiday Highlights contest, both homes and businesses. To those of you who have, all year long, worked hard to make your properties an asset to the town and your neighborhood, THANK YOU! North Beach has never looked better.

I hope that 2012 was a year that brought you blessings and that 2013 will continue to do the same.

NEWS FROM THE WATERFRONT

The beach and Welcome Center will open on April 27th, 2013. Mark your calendars for April 15th to remind you to visit the Town Hall for your annual beach pass and vehicle parking stickers. You may obtain passes and parking stickers Monday through Friday, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. beginning April 15th. Proof of residency is required. Beach Passes and Parking Stickers are valid from May 1st thru October 31st for each calendar year. Town residents will be issued beach passes. You must reside within the town limits to obtain a parking sticker. A copy of your lease agreement for rentals and each vehicle registration showing proof of residency must accompany request (application available at Town Hall and on website) for sticker. Property owners who reside within the town limits will be issued a permanent sticker for each vehicle. Property owners who do not reside within the town limits will not be issued a parking sticker. Renters within the town limits will be issued a parking



sticker valid until April 2014. All sticker requests will be verified by the property records we have on file for the address. Vacation rentals may obtain daily beach passes at the Welcome Center, but must show their Lease Agreement each time. For more information contact Town Hall at 410.257.9618 or 301.855.6681

FORMER COUNCIL MEMBER BARBARA GRAY PASSES

Barbara Harlow Gray, elected to North Beach Town Council in 2002, died on December 18, 2012 at her daughter's home, following a lengthy battle with Alzheimer's disease and breast cancer. Barbara was born on January 1, 1934 and grew up in Cottage City, MD. She graduated from Bladensburg High School in 1951. Barbara married Charles Gray Jr. in 1953. After raising their four children, they retired to North Beach where they were very active in the local community. She was active in the North Beach Garden Club, Northern Calvert Lions Club, North Beach Town Council, and volunteered with Bayside History Museum, and Meals on Wheels. When she was not active with one of her clubs or volunteering she enjoyed crossword puzzles, walking the board walk and meeting her large group of friends every Wednesday for dinner. Barbara has lived for the past three years with her daughter's family in Frederick, MD after being diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease. Per Barbara's wishes she was cremated and interment was private. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS (DPW) UPDATE

Hopefully everyone is enjoying and using the new sidewalk along Frederick Avenue in the Burnt Oaks subdivision area. This should make for a much safer and enjoyable area for pedestrians to walk without having to be in the roadway. This sidewalk now allows pedestrians to walk from the Burnt Oaks area to the waterfront area and remain safe on the network of sidewalks.

So far this year, winter has been kind to the area, but as anyone knows who has lived here any length of time, that can change overnight. Here is a brief outline of the town's snow removal plan in case we receive winter precipitation. Pre-storm, prior to the snow fall,



streets will receive a treatment of salt or chemicals, depending on forecast conditions. When snow reaches a height of three inches, town staff will begin plowing. The staff will try to maintain two clear lanes on all streets and intersections starting with main accesses to and from town and working outward. Please remember in these types of events to use off-street parking, if available, as this is a great help to crews that are trying to clear streets. Once the streets are clear, crews will start clearing parking areas. This will be done while residents are at work or away from the home, which allows crews to be more efficient when parked cars are clear from normal parking areas. Every effort will be made to ensure residents have a safe travel to and from work, etc. For a complete copy of the Snow Removal Plan, please visit the Department of Public Works link under the Government tab on the town website.

Several residents has been asking questions about the construction that is going on in the water on the north side of the pier. The town hired Dissen & Juhn, a well-known shoreline contractor, to install a timber wave barrier to provide protection from the "Nor'easters" the area experiences on a regular basis. This breakwater was built to replace the stone breakwaters that have settled over the years and became ineffective. The project is moving along nicely and should be complete in the next few weeks. This should provide needed protection to the shoreline for many years to come.

It's that time of year to remind all residents and visitors how detrimental it is to waterfowl if they are fed people food. The beach and boardwalk will soon be occupied with a lot of people. To prevent the beach and boardwalk from being occupied with ducks, seagulls and geese, we urge you to NOT toss food to them. While it may be very tempting, it is also detrimental to them and the environment in many ways.



Regular feeding of the waterfowl can cause poor nutrition, spread disease, cause them to lose their natural fear of humans and become aggressive, cause pollution on our beach and in our water, contribute to overcrowding and attract pests.

DOGS RUNNING AT LARGE

Please be reminded that Article II Dogs, Section 26-3 of the code of the Town of North Beach states that no person shall own or harbor within the Town of North Beach any dog unless such dog is licensed as provided by the ordinances and regulations of Calvert County. All ordinances and regulations of Calvert County concerning dogs shall apply within the corporate limits of the Town of North Beach. In addition, this includes the provisions of the Calvert County Code which call for all dogs to be on a leash when in the company of their owner outside the confines of the owner's property. In addition, it is expressly prohibited for any dog to be

on the town beach, whether said dog be at large or on a leash. It is the intention of the Council that dogs are prohibited on the sand beach under all circumstances.

Additionally, Section 26-7, Enforcement, states that the Mayor, Town Code Enforcement Officer, Deputies of the Calvert County Sheriff's Department, and Dog Wardens of Calvert County shall have jurisdiction within the corporate limits of North Beach to enforce all provisions of this article. Section 26-8, Violations and penalties states that violations of this article shall be a municipal infraction.

REMINDERS ABOUT TRASH, RECYCLING AND BULK

Town residents can continue to register for recycling containers and lids from the town website under Quicklinks. You may also purchase an additional 32-gallon recycling container for \$50 from the same website link. The recycling containers are to be used for recyclable material only. If regular trash is placed in the recycling container, it will NOT be picked up by the trash contractor.

Bulk trash pickup is on a once-a-month



basis, by appointment only. To schedule a bulk trash pickup, residents must call Town Hall by the Friday prior to the monthly pickup date. When you call,

you must provide the number of items to be picked up and a brief description of each item. You also need to provide a contact name, street address and phone number. Please see the calendar on pages 10-11 of this

Geocache Trail UNDERWAY

Looking for a fun and interactive way to explore the unique history of Maryland's cities and towns? The Town of North Beach is a participating municipality in the Discovering Maryland Geotrail. The Maryland Municipal League (MML) launched the MML Geotrail on January 5, 2013.

"Geocaching," pronounced "geo-cashing," is a free, interactive outdoor treasure hunt. Participating players seek to locate hidden containers, called "caches" using their smart phone or Global Positioning System (GPS). This is the League's second state-wide trail.

The trail's theme, Discovering Maryland, is designed to promote awareness of and visits to Maryland's municipalities. Visitors and residents alike will get to know Maryland's cities and towns' rich history as they travel towns along the trail. While searching, cachers, are often guided to various attractions like museums, parks and main streets so they can experience as much of the town as possible. The League's ultimate goal is to help support economic development in Maryland municipalities, by bringing as many cities and towns together as possible, within different counties, via the trail. Forty-nine municipalities are participating in the new trail. A geocache trail is a great way for cities and towns to expand tourism by attracting visitors from amongst the thousands that participate in geocaching throughout the United States. IT TAKES FOUR WEEKS TO DECK OUR HALLS

As you may have noticed the Town of North Beach added some new decorations this year to complement our existing decorations. If you are new to the town, here are some impressive facts for you: The town employees and many volunteers decide to get started decorating the second week in November (and working with the weather) to get the installation completed prior to the official lighting of the tree and the annual Santa on the Beach and parade. The total weight of all the decorations is over 5,000 pounds. There is one mile of extension cords and 1,000 feet of those extension cords are on the pier. The Christmas tree is 22 feet tall and adorned with over 800 ornaments. There is 1,875 feet of garland from 1st Street to 5th Street (4 tenths of a mile) dressed with 68 bows. The fourteen, 8-foot figurines from the Nutcracker Suite Ballet, on the t-section of the pier, were created by students and volunteers from Abigail Francisco School of Classical Ballet. Total installation takes about 27 days and over 500 hours to complete.



ANNUAL POLAR BEAR PLUNGE

What we call the “coolest” event of the year, proved to be just that. With a water temperature of just 37 degrees and an air temperature of 39 degrees, 407 brave Polar Bear Plungers jumped into the Chesapeake Bay on January 1, 2013. Because of the work being done on the timber breakwaters on the beach north of the Welcome Center, the plunge was held on the opposite side this year. There were thousands of spectators perched on the boardwalk, finger piers and even on the rocks.

There were three ways to participate in the plunge this year. Participants could pre-register on the town’s website and pay a \$25 registration fee that ensured them a long-sleeve 2013 Polar Bear Plunge t-shirt and a personalized certificate. Participants could also pay the registration fee the day of the plunge and still receive a t-shirt and certificate, although it was first come-first served. The final way to participate was to sign the plunge waiver and jump in!

The town acquired business sponsors for this year’s event. As part of the sponsorship, businesses earned a spot on the town’s 2013 Special Events Banner. This banner will be proudly hung at the boardwalk at each event during this calendar year.

Finally, the net proceeds of the 2013 Polar Bear Plunge were \$3,376.31. The town will present a check in that amount to the Boys & Girls Club at the town council meeting on February 14, 2013. The 2013 Polar Bear Plunge was a tremendous success and we thank all who participated and sponsored this enjoyable event.

Flush This But Not That!

When you use your toilet, shower, washing machine or dishwasher, waste water leaves your home through pipes that connect to the town sewer system. Many materials frequently flushed or poured down the drain can harm the pipes that connect to the town sewer system. Every property owner connected to the town sewer system can be a potential contributor to sewer problems, and a potential victim of those problems. Putting the wrong things down the drain can damage the sewer system, cause sewer backups in your home, and sewer releases to the environment.

The only thing you should ever flush down a toilet is human waste (urine and feces) and toilet paper. Please keep in mind, products that are labeled as "flushable" are not sewer friendly and should not be flushed. Here is a list of some of things to keep OUT of the toilet:

- disposable diapers
- baby wipes
- tampons
- cotton balls & swabs
- mini or maxi pads
- unused medications
- condoms
- cleaning wipes of any kind
- facial tissue
- bandages and bandage wrappings
- disposable hand towels and mechanic's shop rags
- makeup removal wipes



To prevent sewer backups and blockages, please be mindful of what items you are flushing down your toilets and pouring into your sink drains!
